







Strategic Thinking Forum

May 21st, 2009 Buenos Aires, Argentina

BACKGROUND

Within the framework of IIRSA Action Plan for 2009, as defined in the X Meeting of IIRSA's Executive Steering Committee held in Cartagena de Indias, Colombia, in December 2008, a STRATEGIC THINKING FORUM was planned for the participation of IIRSA's member countries, several experts and representatives of the civil society.

Throughout its existence, the Initiative has become a forum for planning by consensus integration infrastructure in South American countries. In this regard, IIRSA Initiative faces the challenge of combining regional and national territorial integration needs and integration at the global context. While the main protagonist in this process is infrastructure, it has to be in good terms with sustainable development and social inclusion.

Since its launching in 2000, IIRSA has achieved some interesting and visible outcomes. To mention just a few of them: *i*) a portfolio of 514 projects related to the physical interconnection of South America, of which 70% are at an advanced stage and 10% have been concluded; *ii*) concerning the selected agenda of 31 projects, 19 are being executed at a good pace and are scheduled for 2010, while 2 have been finished; *iii*) territorial planning methodologies for production, logistics and the environment have been developed and applied with a social dimension, currently available, in some countries of South America, *iv*) and progress has been made in the regulatory harmonization of the postal and telecommunications sectors.

On the basis of these attainments, it is necessary to identify steps and orientations for IIRSA agenda, considering those issues still pending as well as any innovative action intended to widen the Initiative scope. It is precisely the purpose of this Forum to provide inputs that should contribute, in this strategic reflection process, to the tasks related to the physical integration of South America to be undertaken in the short and long run.

This Forum is organized in two days. The first one will be devoted to examining South American integration from different angles, and comparing it with other experiences as well. This first day will encourage the participation of a large number of government officials and representatives of the academia and the civil society. The second day is reserved for the work of IIRSA National Coordinators. Their task will consist in reflecting on the issues dealt with on the previous day and identifying strategic

orientations. This will enable us to come up with ideas built upon consensus for the present and for the future, beyond the year 2010, of the physical integration of South America.
